I knew it was coming. It was still a serious case of sticker shock when I finally heard the news. My car needed a ton of money to repair.

The worst part about it. It was all maintenance—brakes, tires, basic needs for safe reliable transportation. I probably paid double for waiting until now, rather than taking care of it sooner. I already knew what was needed. I just didn't want to pay. I suffered from a case deferred maintenance.

Here's the reality. Maintenance is simply a part of life. It joins death and taxes as inevitable. It's written in the laws of Creation. All things mechanical. All things material. All things are subject to dust and decay. All things need care and maintenance.

Our bodies require a certain amount of maintenance to remain happy, healthy, and hygienic. Daily habits help. Feeding ourselves, brushing our teeth, getting the proper amount of sleep. Sometimes more investment is needed. A doctor's visit warns how deferred maintenance can be hazardous to our health.

I'm constantly reminded how relationships need a healthy amount of maintenance. There are daily and weekly habits of connecting and caring for others in our lives. Deeper investments of time and attention are often necessary. Deferred maintenance can cause big problems in our relational health.

Our spiritual lives require a certain amount of maintenance, too. Nothing quite replaces regular time and attention. It might seem obvious a pastor would write about habits of prayer, contemplation, or going to church. I find those habits are more like feeding yourself, brushing your teeth (hopefully, not falling asleep in church). Different habits work for different people. A deeper investment could be to find practices to help connect and care for your spiritual health.

I even find the life of the church needs regular maintenance. The obvious current need is our siding project—with extreme gratitude for the gifts already given and those still needed. Beyond that, we know everything else is subject to decay. The church is more than physical space. It's the way we treat each another, our work together, our sense of spiritual community requiring constant attention and careful maintenance.

Funny how a costly car repair presented me an important life lesson. I learned best kind of maintenance is rarely deferred. "Getting around to it someday," usually means 'someday' never comes. I invite you to join me considering what needs more attention this season? Is there an area in your life being deferred, and could use a little more care? You can always contact me to talk about such things.

I understand timing is everything. Some things can use a Band-Aid. What other things are just too important to wait? In this together,

MAINTAINING THE CHURCH BUILDING

The General Committee has been working hard for the past 17 months looking for a contractor to side our - church building. We wanted to find the best for the job for an affordable price. We started the process with wanting to wrap the entire structure, but the cost-was too much, and the loss of detail of the building was more than we could support. After much negotiating, the General Committee finalized a contract with Graves Brothers to install vinyl siding and aluminum detail on two sides and rear back of the building (which excludes the front and steeple). This contract is for approximately \$63,000. The work should begin in July and be completed in August, barring any problems. And hopefully there will not be any significant add-ons to the project. We are in the process of looking for a contractor to paint the front of the church and steeple and the facia & soffits of the building since Graves Brothers lost their painting subcontractor. If you know of someone, contact Doug Mayen.

Godbreathed by Zack Hunt As reviewed by Helen Wallbank, Stephentown, NY

One thing I love about our Federated Church, is that anyone who walks through our door is on their own spiritual path. Most of us have been traveling this road a while.

It is that curiosity which led me to a progressive, funny, blogger named Zach Hunt.

I was invited to, and joined the launch team for his newest book, Godbreathed: What it Really Means for the Bible to be Divinely Inspired.

Here is the review I wrote. Welcome to a bit of my journey.

My advice: Don't ignore this book just because it's about the Bible! For those of us who seek a spiritual life, it just may reignite our passion for this collection of maddening, yet endearing, poetry and prose.

Godbreathed, authored by Zack Hunt, reintroduces us to a source many have felt the need to leave behind thanks to decades of "Christian" teachings.

Zack Hunt is no slouch. His theological pedigree is impressive. He is a graduate of Trevecca Nazarene University. He has both a graduate degree in Theology and a graduate degree in Christian History from Yale Divinity School. Zack has been on the front lines of preaching and ministry for over 20 years, has written a previous book, *Unraptured*, and continues to write articles about the daily entanglements of faith and politics.

Within *Godbreathed* we follow the evolution of a young evangelical Zack as he studies the actual development of the book he adores. We are introduced to ancient Biblical scholars, including Origen and Augustine, and recognize that contradictions and apparent flaws have been the essence of the Bible's message since its inception.

And Yes! There is Good, even Great, News along this journey.

"the gospel isn't good news because it's perfect. It's good news because it breathes new life into a world of death, and we don't have to be perfect to proclaim that message. "Godbreathed, Zack Hunt, loc 1997

You will not regret walking this path of Biblical discovery with Zack. It has strengthened my faith and reignited my passion for wrestling against the current "Christian "campaign of misinterpretation and condemnation. Give it a read. I believe even the faithful will find a reaffirming message.
